ROCKY MOUNTAIN SYNOD SYNOD ASSEMBLY MEMORIALS & RESOLUTIONS PASSED

SUMMARY OF THE MEMORIAL AND RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN SYNOD 2025 ASSEMBLY

The majority of the voting members of the 2025 Rocky Mountain Synod Assembly voted in favor of one memorial, **Stand up for Human Rights, an End to the Occupation of Palestine, and Recognition of Palestinian Statehood.** This memorial will be submitted for adoption at the 2025 Churchwide Assembly.

The Resolves of this memorial read:

RESOLVED, that the Rocky Mountain Synod memorialize the 2025 ELCA Assembly to encourage ELCA members to advocate for the human rights of all Palestinians and Israelis and support policies that bring an end to the occupation and promote a just and peaceful resolution of the conflict; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Rocky Mountain Synod memorialize the 2025 ELCA Assembly to urge the Presiding Bishop to direct a letter to the President and Vice President of the United States, the Secretary of State, and the majority and minority leaders of the U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives condemning the human rights violations listed above and calling on the U.S. government to

- recognize Palestine as a sovereign state and support Palestine's full membership in the United Nations;
- halt military assistance to Israel (especially bombs and equipment that have been used to devastate Gaza), investigate the use of U.S. military aid to Israel to ensure compliance with U.S. and international human rights law, and work to end the genocide against the Palestinians of Gaza;
- reject schemes to remove Palestinians from Gaza and the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, address the
 catastrophic living conditions that could force Palestinians to leave, and work to end the rampant settler violence
 against Palestinians in the West Bank; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Rocky Mountain Synod memorialize the 2025 ELCA Assembly to encourage individuals, congregations, and synods of the ELCA to pray for Palestinians and Israelis, Jews, Christians and Muslims, who work to create a future of justice, equality, reconciliation, and peace for all, including our siblings of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), Augusta Victoria Hospital operated by the Lutheran World Federation (LWF), and the World Council of Churches/Ecumenical Accompaniment Program in Palestine and Israel (WCC/EAPPI) who offer comfort, support, accountability, and relief.

THREE RESOLUTIONS WERE ALSO ADOPTED BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

The first, **The Campus Ministry Resolution to the 2025 Rocky Mountain Synod**, was submitted by the Rocky Mountain Campus Ministry Committee. The Resolves read:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rocky Mountain Synod in Assembly support and affirm Campus Ministry as a crucial part of the whole church's ministry to and with young adults by:

- encouraging all of its members, pastors, support staff, representatives, and friends to pray for and support Rocky
 Mountain Synod Campus Ministries in proclaiming God's Word on our college and university campuses.
- o lifting up campus ministry in print, online publications, and other media systems
- encouraging financial support from congregations and individual members both through benevolence to the Rocky
 Mountain Synod and direct support to RMS campus ministries
- encouraging congregations to highlight campus ministry one Sunday each year and strengthen their ongoing relationships with campus ministry and develop new relationships and methods of support, and

RESOLVED, that we embrace campus ministry as a way to encourage young adults in faith formation and leadership and celebrate that these young people grow to be pastors, lay leaders, teachers, and more within our congregations, and become leaders in our communities, and across the globe.

The second resolution, **Honoring Indigenous Peoples Through Faith, Respect, and Action**, was submitted by the Rocky Mountain Synod Creation Care Team. The Resolves read:

Therefore, be it resolved: that Lutherans of the RMS, in this time of natural resource challenges and opportunities, address Indigenous peoples through meaningful action appropriate to each state and local setting in the RMS.

Be it further resolved: that congregations be encouraged to engage with ELCA documents to guide their understanding of the underlying causes of harm to Indigenous peoples in the United States and within the RMS,

Be it further resolved: that congregations be encouraged to use appropriate land acknowledgements (6,7) of Tribal nations and Indigenous peoples for church gatherings, worship, programs and written materials,

Be it further resolved: that congregations be encouraged to study and utilize educational resources that address changing climate impacts to the entire RMS with special attention to the long-term stewardship of land, air and water,

Be it further resolved: that congregations be encouraged to recognize the value of indigenous ways of caring for land and creation and work to incorporate these values and methods in creation care policies and activities,

Be it further resolved: that congregations be encouraged to engage with and support Indigenous peoples and organizations that educate, assist and lift up tribal rights, repair social injustices, and spread stewardship knowledge.



The third, Renewing Our Welcome: Strengthening Our Reconciling in Christ Commitment

Whereas all people are created in the image of God (Genesis 1:27) and are called to love one another as Christ has loved us (John 13:34 and all people include those who identify as Lesbian, Bisexual, Gay, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, or Asexual (LGBTQIA+);

Whereas the Rocky Mountain Synod in assembly adopted its welcome statement and became a Reconciling in Christ Synod, affirming its commitment to LGBTQIA+ inclusion in the life of the church;

Whereas LGBTQIA+ people celebrate their identities at various times throughout the year, including but not limited to Coming Out Day (Oct. 10), Transgender Day of Remembrance (Nov. 20), Transgender Day of Visibility, Bisexual Awareness Day, and Pride Month;

Whereas the ELCA Conference of Bishops has affirmed in its statements a commitment to stand with those who are marginalized and oppressed;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Rocky Mountain Synod renew its commitment as a Reconciled in Christ Synod in the following ways:

1. Public Acknowledgment & Education

- The Synod office is encouraged to prominently acknowledge LGBTQIA+ observances (Coming Out Day, Transgender Day of Remembrance, Pride Month, Bisexual Awareness Day, etc.) through the Synod newsletter, website, and other communications.
- The bishop, alongside other pastors, deacons, synod staff, and lay leaders of this synod, resolve to publish statements and reflections in the synod newsletter to highlight the significance of these events for the life of the church and the wider world.

2. Worship & Community Engagement

- The Synod office is encouraged to support, encourage, and provide resources for congregations to observe Transgender Day of Remembrance and RIC Sunday.
- Synod staff is encouraged to actively participate in these services, reaffirming the synod's Reconciled in Christ status and commitment to LGBTQIA+ justice.

3. Advocacy & Public Witness

- The Rocky Mountain Synod, through the leadership of Bishop Megan and Lutheran Advocacy, will advocate against laws targeting LGBTQIA+ individuals in accordance with the social statements of this church.
- The Synod office will provide resources and guidance for congregations, clergy, and lay leaders to engage in advocacy and public witness in their communities.

4. Congregational Encouragement & Support

• The Synod office is encouraged to equip and encourage congregations to consider becoming Reconciled in Christ congregations, offering training, mentorship, and networking with existing RIC communities.

The Village Exchange Center



Pastor Marcel Narucki, a Lutheran minister and former Camaldolese monk, co-founded the Village Exchange Center (VEC) in Aurora, Colorado, alongside his stepdaughter Amanda Blaurock. In 2017, they transformed the declining St. Matthew Lutheran Church into a nonprofit dedicated to celebrating religious and cultural diversity. The VEC serves as a community hub for immigrants and refugees, offering programs like ESL classes, a food pantry, and multi-faith worship services.
