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2023 Fall Gathering Summary

If you were able to attend the RMSWO Fall Gathering in Colorado Springs you know what a wonderful event it was. If you weren't able to be there, let me give you a summary of what we did.

The event was held at the Peel House at First Lutheran. What a lovely location! This is a restored mansion with a rich history and a wonderful team who supported our event in so many ways! More about that as you read this article.

We began on Friday evening, October 6th. After a welcome from our RMSWO President, Anna

Thompson, we heard from Cindy Weaver and Ralph Patrick from Family Promise. This is an organization which some of you are familiar with. (Several years ago. it was known as Interfaith Hospitality Network or IHN.) **Families** without homes are housed in various churches for one or two weeks at a time. This gives them a bit of stability and a safe place to sleep for at least a week at a time. The churches provide a temporary home, meals, and a place for the children to play in the evenings. The parents work or go to the day house during each day, and the children go to school, day care or to the day house with their parents.

Their goal is to give the families a hand up while they work toward a more permanent place to live. If your church isn't involved or unable to house families, consider providing a meal or two at a church that does house them. Every volunteer is appreciated!

We were blessed with evening communion worship led by Bishop Jim Gonia. His presence and his words were inspiring even if (as he admitted) he had never preached on the book of Joshua! Joshua was the successor of Moses. Our Bible















theme verse was Joshua 22:5; "Take good care to observe the commandment and instruction that Moses the servant of the Lord commanded you. To love the Lord your God, to walk in all His ways, to keep His commandments, and to hold fast to Him, and to serve Him with all your heart and with all your soul." Bishop Gonia made sure we understood that this is encouragement, not a todo list. We learned a lot and loved this time together in worship.

We ended Friday evening with an inspiring time of learning with Pastor Kelsey Fauser from Grace in Colorado Springs and Pastor Stephani Shumaker from Atonement in Boulder. They also admitted that they had never preached or studied the book of Joshua. You couldn't tell that from their very interactive Bible study. This was a great study, and they were a great pastoral team presenting the information.

Saturday was a full day! The day began with Pastor Kelsey and Pastor Stephanie leading part two of the Bible study. Reading and having time to discuss five different versions of our theme verse was amazing. How different the messages and perception of them are from the International Children's Bible, The Voice, The Message, The NIV and The Jewish Orthodox Bible. This led to a very engaged discussion by the participants.

Was the verse a reward? Was it a blessing? Was it a commandment? If you weren't there you'd need to read them to see what you think. Thanks to both knowledgeable and energetic pastors for leading us in this time of learning!

What a blessing to hear her presentation.

We used some of our time to put together 25 Elder boxes which became Christmas gifts for elders on reservations. One Nation Walking Together was very grateful for these donated boxes! At the same time, we were led in a session of chair yoga by Maren Felde from St. Paul's Cheyenne. If you've never tried it, it's a worthwhile way to spend about 30 minutes. Relaxing and energizing at the same time! Later we participated in a guided meditation which was just what a lot of us needed! It was calming and grounding and helped us all refocus for the rest of the evening lead by Debra Haar, treasurer of the RMSWO.

We heard from Susan Bolduc; she spoke to us about "Beyond Charity". It was very informative, and she provided us with many resources to learn more about civic engagement. Many of them are on the ELCA website.

We had another wonderful meal put out on a buffet table by the team from First Lutheran. They certainly have a way of taking the ordinary and making it extraordinary! The RMSWO board cannot thank them enough for their hard work, including setting up and cleaning after our meals!

After dinner we had drawings for handmade quilts made by the quilters at Prince of Peace (Colorado Springs), Grace (Colorado Springs), King of Kings (Pueblo), Saint Luke's (Albuquerque), and Saint Paul's (Cheyenne). We also had some gift bags and 6 beautiful fall mums that were given away.

Remembering Katie by Audrey Novak Riley

We remember Katie Luther not only as Martin's wife and the mother of their six children, but also as the energetic, and effective manager of all that went on at Lutherhaus – its flocks and fields, its brewery and its boarding house – and as a bold, thoughtful, faithful woman.

Katie became a nun at the age of 16, no doubt expecting to live out her days in the convent's peaceful routine of prayer and contemplation. But years later Katie and some of her sisters learned about a new movement in the church and realized that they had to change their lives. Martin

and his friends – under great risk – smuggled the women away in the wee hours of Easter morning, 1523.

Katie Luther stood for the courage of her convictions, even in the face of the sternest opposition. That's an inspiration to all of us. And her wise management of the Luther family's resources is another inspiration. What other parts of Katie's personality and life story do you find especially inspiring? How can we be more like her? At Sarah's Home we believe in reaching as many people as possible in order to educate them about trafficking in our nation. We believe that education is vital in the prevention of trafficking. Once that information has been shared, it's not uncommon that people then ask, "now what? How do I help protect the kids in my life? In my sphere of influence?" We hear you, and we want to help!

Before we jump into some resources, it is important for you to hear this. The most important thing that you can do for the kids in your life is to LOVE, ENCOURAGE and SUPPORT them. Most of the resources we are going to share have a similar heartbeat which is, while these conversations are important to have, the best thing that you can do for kids in your life is to be a safe place for them. That means showing up in the little things so that when the world gets scary. Don't underestimate the importance of your presence in the lives of these kids. It matters!

It may be tempting to want to keep your kids as close as possible at all times after hearing about the realities of trafficking. But the truth is that at some point in their life, kids will encounter and interact with the world. As people of influence in their life, what will you do to help build resilience in them? Then, when they encounter something

scary, they will have the tools to know what to do. We would suggest that you talk to them. That you take the time to have some difficult and sometimes uncomfortable conversations with them. We recognize that this is an easy thing to say, but can be really intimidating to execute. That is why we want to give you resources that will empower you to feel confident in initiating these conversations.

We also understand that there are so many different angles that this subject can be approached. Depending on the age of the child, these conversations need to look different. Our hope is to give you a wide range of resources so that you can pick ones that work well for you and the kids in your life.



Why is making a will important?

Are you one of the nearly 67% of American adults who don't have a will? Then National Make-A-Will Month, observed each August, is a perfect time to make end-of-life decisions. (And if you do have a will allow this month to serve as a reminder to review and update your will.)

Wills are not just for rich people. Everyone should have a will. If a person doesn't have a will, the state will impose a pattern of distribution of assets. That pattern may or may not be what the deceased would have wanted. That's one reason it's important to have a will. With a will, an individual decides how to distribute assets. That could be cash savings, real estate, or stocks. It could just as easily be an antique glass collection, photos and slides from three decades of vacations, or specialty tools for quilting or woodworking. What happens to digital accounts, another type of asset, can also be resolved in a will.

Having a will can also be seen as a gift to loved ones. It helps those who survive know what to do. The presence of a will has the potential, too, to stave off arguments among survivors. It's no guarantee that two grandchildren aren't going to fight over who gets the collection of troll dolls, but at least grandma's will can make it clear who she wants to inherit that special collection.

With a will, a person can plan for those in their care. A legal guardian for children can be named (is that something one would want to leave to the state to decide?) Who will care for Fluffy or Rover? That can be established in a will too.

Some people find it challenging in their lifetimes to be as generous as they would like to be. Tithing may be somewhat beyond what a person has been able to accomplish during their lifetime. But setting aside a tithe in a will to a local congregation or a church college is as simple as saying "ten percent of my estate shall go to [insert institution]."

Whether you are creating a will now or reviewing an existing one, pause this month to consider what you value and make sure those values are re-

flected in your will. If your participation in Women of the ELCA has been important throughout your lifetime, then won't you remember Women of he ELCA with a gift through your estate plan? Such a gift can help ensure that long after your life on this side of God's commonwealth is over, other women will experience the importance of the church's women's organization.

Right now, you might consider making an estate gift to **2122: Growing Katie's Fund for the next 100 years,** a campaign to raise \$1 million for Katie's Fund that is designed to support the organization into the next 100 years of mission and ministry. WHITE CHICKEN CHILI (6 Servings)

1 medium onion, finely chopped

3 T. olive oil

1 (4 oz.) can chopped green chilies Salsa

3 T. all-purpose flour

2 t. ground cumin

2 (15.8oz.) cans white kidney beans

1 (14.5oz.) can chicken broth

1.5 cups finely chopped cooked chicken breast

Shredded Cheese

Sour Cream

In large skillet, cook onion in oil for 4 minutes or until transparent. Add Chilies, add flour and cumin slowly, stir until dissolved cook and for 2 minutes.

Add beans and chicken broth; bring to a boil. stirring for 10 minutes or until thickened. Reduce heat to medium. Add chicken, cook until hot.

Garnish with cheese, sour cream and salsa if desired.

Elections, Support for Antiracism, Healing Work Feature Large — Women of the ELCA

More than 251 Women of the ELCA voting members worshipped together, conducted business and elected new officers and churchwide executive board members during the Twelfth Triennial Convention, Sept. 18-21, in Phoenix, Arizona.

The voting body elected Myrna Wells-Ulland, Phoenix, Arizona (Grand Canyon Synodical Women's Organization), as president shown above.

"Women of the ELCA is a wonderful organization," said Myrna Wells-Ulland, elected on the fourth ballot as the organization's president for the 2023-2026 triennium. "I love the things we do [and] all of the initiatives we have. I know they are challenging. . . I am really excited about the capabilities we have for this next triennium. [In Hebrew], hineni means 'Here I am, Lord. You called me. Use me. So I'm going to close with that. Hineni."

Other officers elected are: Lorie Garcia, Corpus Cristi, Texas (SW Texas SWO), vice president; Gwen Edwards, Bellevue, Nebraska (Nebraska SWO), secretary; and Jennifer Armstrong-Schaefer, Latrobe, Pennsylvania (SW PA SWO), treasurer.

Those elected to serve on the churchwide executive board are: Jean Pishaw, Forest Grove, Oregon (Oregan SWO); Maria Lokensgard, St. Peter Minnesota (SW MN SWO); Jennifer Ackerman, Elyria, Ohio (NE Ohio SWO); Iulia Sabella, Hillsborough Township, New Jersey (NJ SWO); Sheena Foster, Silver Spring, Maryland (Metro Washington DC SWO); Anna Jetson, Spring Grove, Minnesota (NE IA SWO); Tracy Williams, Long Beach, California (SW CA SWO); Yma Mulero, Carolina, Puerto Rico (Caribbean SWO); Ginger Cutrell, Manchester, Tennessee (SE

SWO); Joyce Brooks, Detroit, Michigan (SE MI SWO); Merrily Burmeister, Bemidji, Minnesota (E NDSWO). Officers and churchwide executive board members will serve the 2023-2026 term.

It was the first time the convention had met in person in six years, after many changes wrought by the pandemic. As executive director Linda Post Bushkofsky told voting members in her report, "Few things remain the same . . . The pandemic and all that it brought caused us to focus, with laser precision, on what really matters. It caused us to try different ways of being together in community."

.... The Holy Spirit is pushing and pulling us forward. Some of us are jumping on board, moving into the future. [Others} of us won't be making that journey, resisting the reality of where we are going. But the good news is, that the journey has begun. . . . We are a big, beautiful, flawed community, created in the image of God, [living] as disciples of Jesus."
